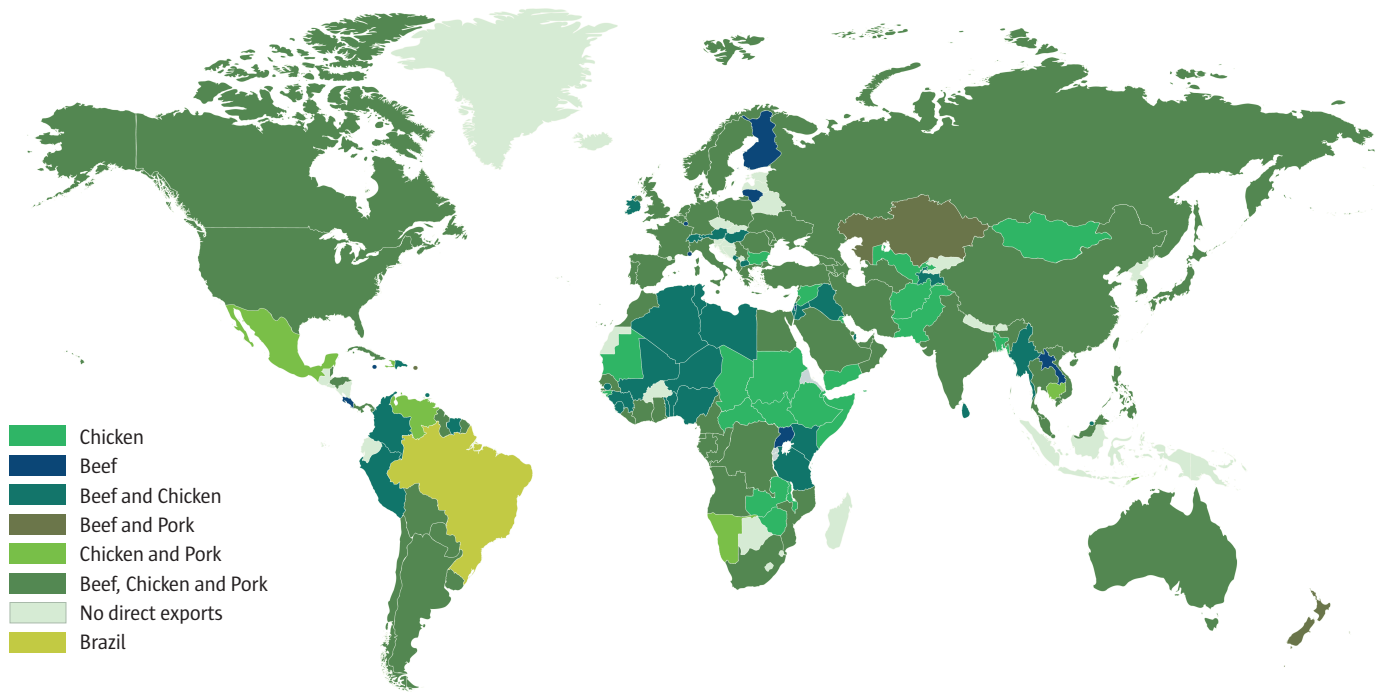

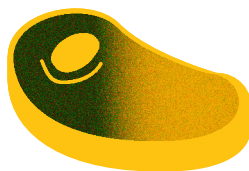

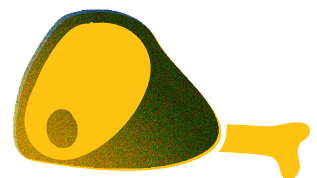

SANITARY INSPECTION

of LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS

The animal health control of Brazilian livestock is comprehensive and is enforced in all regions in Brazil. The Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Food Supply requires the presence of an official veterinarian supervisor in all slaughter plants, full-time, for both *antemortem* and *postmortem* inspections.

This surveillance is fundamental to ensure the safety of meats for export and domestic consumption.



ANIMAL WELFARE AND HUMANE SLAUGHTER ACT

The Brazilian Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Food Supply determines that all slaughter plants must adopt animal welfare procedures. Moreover, Brazil applies the standards of the World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) for animal welfare.

Cattle fattening in pastures accounts for 88% of the cattle production in Brazil, only 12% of the animals passing through feedlots.



Brazil has an internationally acknowledged **high standard of veterinary services.**
