

Brazil is the largest exporter of soy, coffee, orange juice and sugar, and the second-largest exporter of corn. The country also ranks first in beef and chicken exports and forth in pork exports.

THE MOST RECENT PROJECTIONS PUBLISHED IN AGRICULTURAL OUTLOOK BY THE UNITED NATIONS FOOD AND AGRICULTURE ORGANIZATION (FAO) AND THE ORGANIZATION FOR ECONOMIC COOPERATION AND DEVELOPMENT (OECD) ESTIMATE THAT, OVER THE NEXT TEN YEARS, BRAZIL'S FOOD SUPPLY WILL GROW ABOVE THE GLOBAL AVERAGE.



OECD FORECASTS IMPROVEMENT IN BRAZILIAN PRODUCTIVITY

Based on FAO's forecast that demand growth will be driven both by population growth and by increased per capita consumption (per capita income), OECD also predicts increased consumption of the world's main food products.

Consumption growth is estimated at around 1% for meat, fish, grains and roots and tubers. Sugar and milk consumption will grow at around 2% a year. The highest growth rate will be for vegetable oils, at 4.5%.

ACCORDING TO FAO/OECD, IN 2026, BRAZIL'S PRODUCTION OF VARIOUS AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS WILL GROW AT RATES FAR ABOVE THE WORLD AVERAGE.












BRAZIL: AMONG THE 10 LARGEST EXPORTERS OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS
